# Crafty Corner

Make this cute button necklace (or bracelet)!



#### You will need:

- Buttons an assortment of red and purple buttons in different sizes. 2 hole buttons are a bit easier to use, but 4 hole buttons work fine.
- Embroidery floss, very thin cord or hat elastic About 4 times longer than you want the necklace.
- Beads (for decorating) Optional
- A needle (Optional) This helps threading. Make sure the needle is small enough to fit through the button holes and beads easily, but not too small that your cord won't thread through.

If using elastic to make a stretchy bracelet/necklace you can just knot the ends together when you've finished adding the buttons, and won't need a closure.

Or you could thread the buttons on to hat elastic, to make a stretchy bracelet and just knot the ends together when you've finished adding the buttons. For a 2 hole button I found it best to put the cord through twice to stop the buttons sliding around. If you want a stretchy bracelet, only thread the elastic through once, and on a 4 hole button, only thread the elastic through from left to right.

If using embroidery floss or thin cord that isn't stretchy, you can make a button closure by tying a button with a shank onto one end of your cord, then when you have finished threading all the buttons on, you'll tie a loop on the other end to form the closure. Or you could use a jewellery clasp if you wish.

To make the necklace, it is simply a case of threading the buttons and beads onto the cord/elastic. You can do this however you like, making it very full, or only using a few buttons. If using a 4 hole button with elastic, only thread the elastic through from left to right if you want the buttons to be able to slide along the elastic.

If you want the buttons to stay put and not slip around (if using a non-stretchy cord for example), thread the cord through 2 hole buttons twice if you can, to secure it in place. For a 4 hole button, pass the thread through the bottom hole, then through the top. Then out the hole on the left and in the hole on the right.

When your necklace is long enough, tie a loop at the end for your shank button to fit onto. And you have a lovely new necklace!

## "Red Hat Layered Dessert"

### **Ingredients:**

1 pack red (strawberry) jelly crystals

1 pack purple (grape) jelly crystals

2 tins of evaporated milk

#### Method:

Make the purple jelly, but using only half the amount of water listed in the directions on the pack. Put this in the fridge for about an hour until it is the consistency of egg whites. Beat in 1 tin of evaporated milk or 1 cup of yoghurt.

Pour into clear serving dishes, to half fill the dish. Refrigerate until the mixture has set. Make the red jelly in the same method as you did the purple jelly. Pour this over the purple layer in the serving dishes and refrigerate again until the red layer has set. You can then serve this topped with strawberries and blueberries with a dollop of whipped cream.

**Variations** – You could alternate a regular (translucent) jelly layer with the opaque layer for interesting effect. If you want to make a firm dessert that can be set in a large tray and cut into squares or used in a jelly mould, add an additional tablespoon of plain, unflavoured gelatine to the jelly mixture.
